Tewksbury Piecemakers Board Meeting March 19, 2024

In attendance were Nancy Araway, Carol Calistro, Sandy Cook, Susan Doherty, Kathy Graham, Cheryle Laffey, Jo-Ann Lightfoot, Cam Michallyszyn, Kristina Noonan, Elaine Walsh, Pat Wolf, Mary Arcidy.

The speaker for the April meeting will be Pam Weeks from the Quilt Museum in Lowell.

Just a friendly reminder, the baskets for the Quilt Show will be put together during the May meeting.

The changing of bylaws and policies due to the lack of nominations for President and Vice President were discussed at length. Several ideas were offered as options. One such idea was having a Committee of Ten, with one person running one month's meeting, another person running the next month's meeting etc.

There will need to be a budget for each meeting, parameters for the budget, and a breakdown of the budget for each meeting. There also will need to be a coordination of types of activities planned for each meeting, etc.

Another change to be voted on by the Guild will be having the meeting year run from March through December. This would eliminate meetings in January and February and add meetings in July and August.

All changes will be discussed at the April meeting.

Designed by Jacquelynne Steves. Sample made by Kathryn F. Taylor of Silly Kat Quilts. Facebook.com/SillyKatQuilts. Approximate finished size: 12 1/2" x 17 1/2"

Supplies and Materials:

Cotton fabric:

White/Ivory/Cream scraps for background (4 different prints/patterns)
Green fabric for background and binding – 3/8 yard
Scraps for machine appliqué- Green, Blue, Yellow, Orange,
Purple
Cotton Fabric of choice for backing- 17" x 22"
Thin cotton batting- 15" x 20"
Lightweight Fusible Interfacing- ½ yard (optional, but I find that it gives a nicer finish to machine applique)

Lightweight Fusible web for machine applique Embroidery floss- dark brown and yellow Buttons- 14 assorted colors and sizes (3/8" – 3/4") Thread in desired colored for machine appliqué Marker for transferring embroidery design

All Seam allowances 1/4", sew right sides together unless otherwise specified.



Make the background:

Cut 4 squares from White/Ivory/Cream fabrics, each 6 ½" x 6 ½". Sew 2 squares together and repeat with other 2 squares, press seam allowances to one side. Sew the 2 units together so you have a large square, press seam allowances open. This will be the background for your appliqued flower pot, it should measure 12 1/2" square.


Cut Green fabric 12 ½" x 5 ½". Trace "Spring has Sprung" onto Green fabric. Backstitch with 3 strands of Dark Brown embroidery floss. Press on wrong side of fabric.

Sew pieced White/Ivory/Cream background to top of Green fabric. Press seam allowances toward Green.

Machine appliqué:

(Optional step) Cut fusible interfacing 17 ½" x 12 ½". Fuse to back (wrong side) of wall hanging according to manufacturer's directions.

Trace pattern pieces onto paper side of fusible web, cut out leaving about 1/8" around the edges. Fuse to wrong side of fabrics, according to manufacturer's directions. Cut out pieces on line.

Referring to placement diagram, arrange appliqué pieces on background. We will use buttons as the "flowers" for stems #1 and #5.

Fuse pieces in place according to manufacturer's instructions. Applique with desired stitch, such as zig zag or blanket stitch.

Layer the wall hanging, batting, and backing fabric together; quilt as desired.

Cut (2) 2 1/4" x width of fabric strips. Bind wall hanging with Green fabric strips.

Using 4 strands of yellow embroidery floss, sew large X's to corners of wall hanging (refer to photo pg 1). Using 4 strands of brown embroidery floss, sew a large running stitch (about ¼" long) around the border of the White/Ivory/Cream background, about ¾" from the edge (refer to photo).


Arrange buttons as desired, sew on with 4 strands of yellow embroidery floss with knots on top. Trim threads to 1/4" long.




Make a dowel pocket for hanging:

Cut a piece of fabric 12" x 3 ½". Turn short ends under ¼" toward wrong side of fabric, and topstitch turned under edge to finish the edges. With wrong sides out, fold fabric in half lengthwise, and sew the long edges together to make a tube. Turn right side out and press.

Pin tube to the back of the wall hanging, about 1" from the top. Hand stitch the long edges of the tube to the backing. Insert a dowel or rod through tube for hanging. If you cannot figure out how to make a sleeve, YouTube has tutorials, or we can demo it at the meeting. Just ask.

ALL QUILTS WILL NEED A SLEEVE. GENERAL DIRECTIONS

- 1. Cut and Sew **or** piece together fabric to make a strip 9 or 10 inches tall and the same width as the quilt. Fold under both short edges, wrong sides together, about 1/4 inch. Fold under again to double the fabric, and press. Sew a straight or zigzag seam to hem the folds.
 - 2. Fold and Sew Lengthwise

Now fold the strip lengthwise, wrong sides together, aligning its raw edges. Sew together with a 1/2-inch seam allowance. Press the seam allowance open.

3. Sew Tube to Backing

Place the open seam against the quilt's back. Center and pin the top edge of the tube to the back of the quilt, about 1/2-inch below the binding. Use a whipstitch to sew the top edge of the tube to the quilt backing. Stitch into the <u>quilt batting</u> occasionally to help strengthen the seam but do not allow the stitches to show on the front of the quilt.

4. Attach the Sleeve to Quilt

Pin the sleeve bottom to the guilt.

Whipstitch the lower edge of the sleeve to the quilt. Remove the pins. The sleeve will pooch out a bit to allow space for a hanging rod. Whipstitch the (short) back sides of the sleeve to the quilt. Leave the front sides unsewn to allow for rod insertion.


Another way – Fold 10 inch squares into a triangle.

Stitch fold onto backing, letting point hang down.

Tack down the points. Rod will slide between the triangle and the quilt.

Use enough triangles to support your quilt.

The "pocket" will be between the quilt back and the triangle.



Sunbonnet Sue Vacationing After COVID Quilt Show Challenge

This challenge will be featuring Sunbonnet Sue dressed in her most appropriate outfit for vacation. You can choose where you want her to go. It could be your favorite country, state, beach, amusement park or whatever you would like. Be creative!! She should be made on an 18" X 18" finished square. I have included a blank pattern of Sunbonnet Sue as a size guide. The background on the square should depict the vacation spot she is visiting. You can use whatever embellishments you want, embroidery, applique, fabric painting, beads, buttons or whatever you would like to create your scene. The sky's the limit!

Rules:

- 1. Sunbonnet Sue should be dressed for a vacation destination of your choice.
- 2. Her face must be hidden by her bonnet/hat.
- This mini quilt should measure 18" X 18".
- 4. No restrictions on embellishments which may be used.
- 5. Finished challenge quilts must be turned in by our March guild meeting on 3/12/24.
- 6. Have fun and enjoy your mini vacation!
